South Oxfordshire District Councillor Report – Sam Casey-Rerhaye, May 2022

Homes for Ukraine

The system is working and in full swing across Oxfordshire to support the government's Homes for Ukraine scheme. We are working with all the Councils on a co-ordinated approach. While we still have limited government guidance in some areas, in particular around grant payments, all partners across the county are working together to find solutions and put guests at the heart of any action required.

The accommodation and safeguarding checks are progressing well, with the backlog of home checks almost completed, and with no significant concerns raised this week.

The £200 payments to our guests to help them with immediate costs while they settle in are being made by whoever makes the first physical contact with them as part of these checks.

We have been doing with Asylum Welcome to develop a proposal to expand the community liaison officer resource available in each district and the city. The purpose would be for this resource to coordinate, advise and refer guests to the support that is available to them, including across housing, education and health. This has now been agreed and recruitment to these posts has begun. When recruited the roles will be based within our community support hub.
